



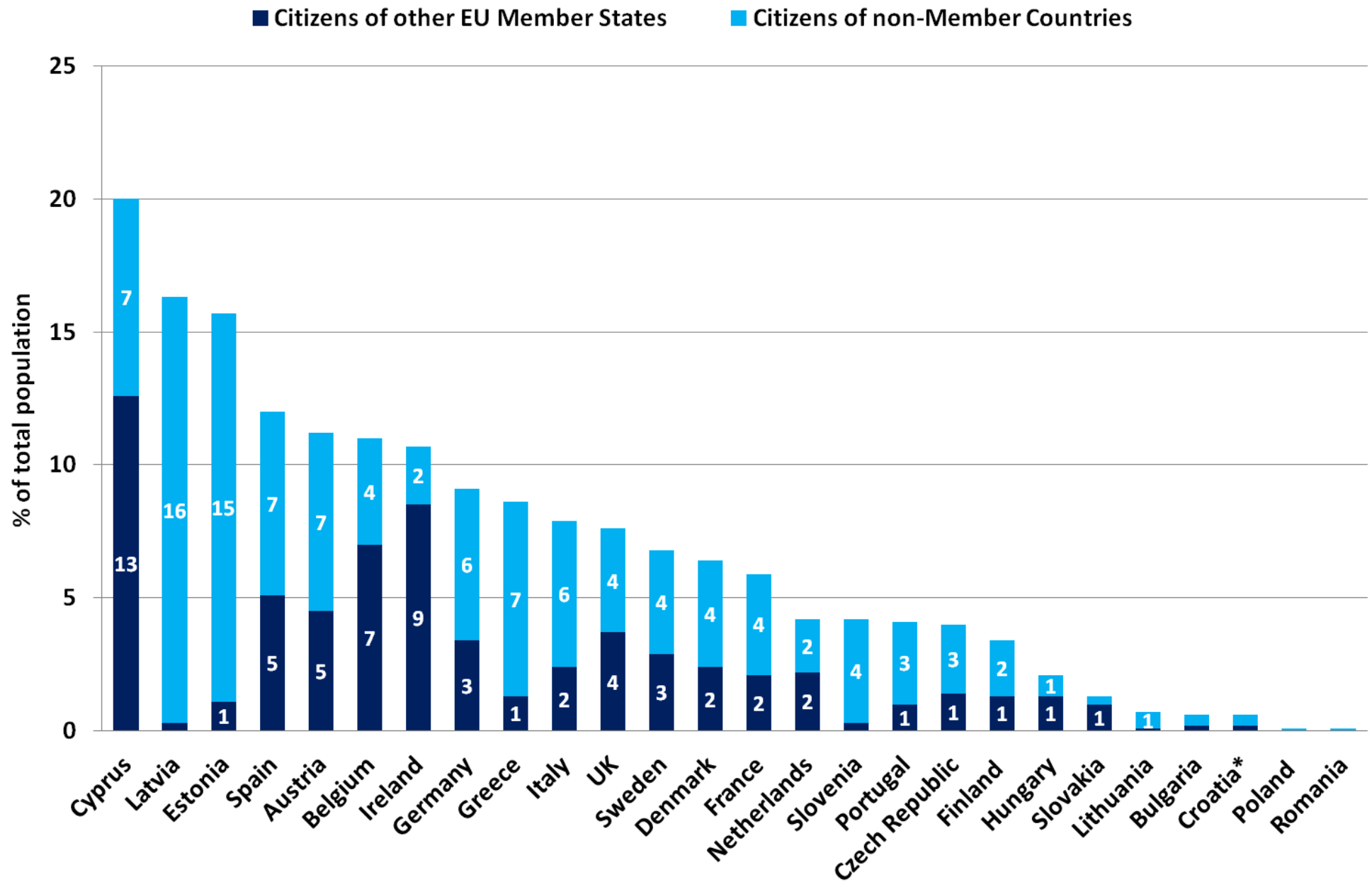

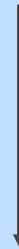

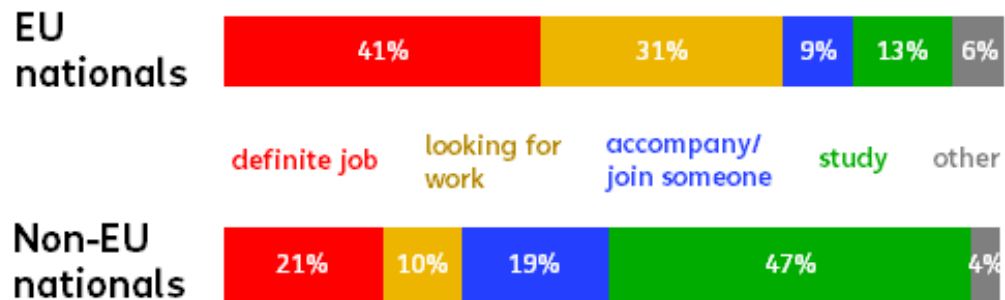

Reasons for coming here

The majority of citizens from other EU countries say they come to work or to find work. Others usually come to study or to join family members in the UK. That contrasts with non-EU immigrants, who mainly say they come to study.

Britain has suffered a huge brain drain in recent years.

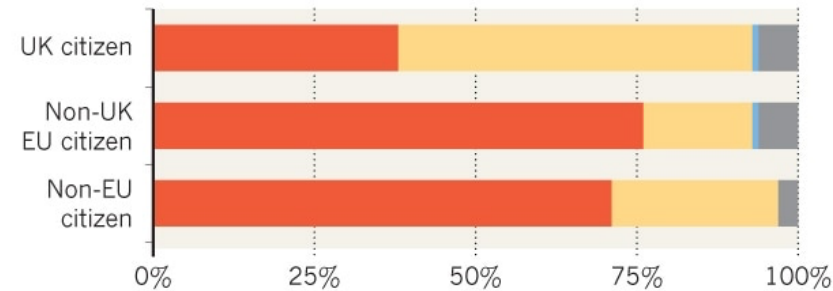


UK RESEARCHERS CONSIDER LIFE ABROAD

As a result of the Brexit vote, are you more or less likely to consider leaving the UK higher-education sector?

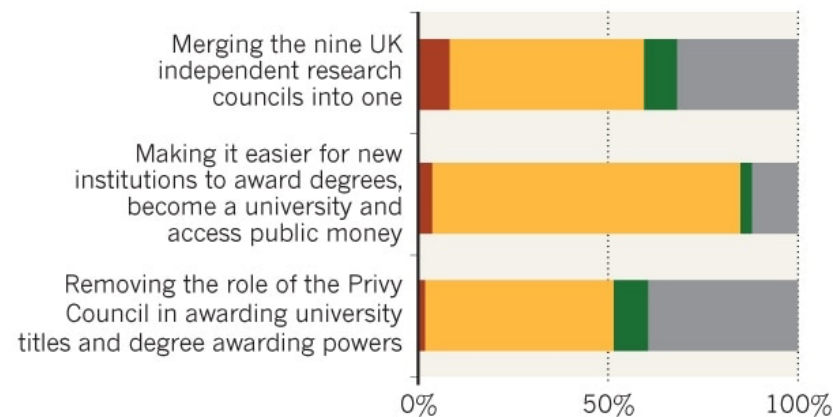
More likely Neither more nor less likely

THERESA MAY'S SPEECH AGAINST IMMIGRATION

- She warned that “millions” of people wanted to migrate to the UK.

“There are millions of people in poorer countries who would love to live in Britain, and there is a limit to the amount of immigration any country can and should take.”

- She argued that immigrants could make society less “cohesive”.

“When immigration is too high, when the pace of change is too fast, it’s impossible to build a cohesive society.”

- She blamed immigrants for pressures on public services.

“It’s difficult for schools and hospitals and core infrastructure like housing and transport to cope.”

Share of Immigrants and Their Children on the Rise

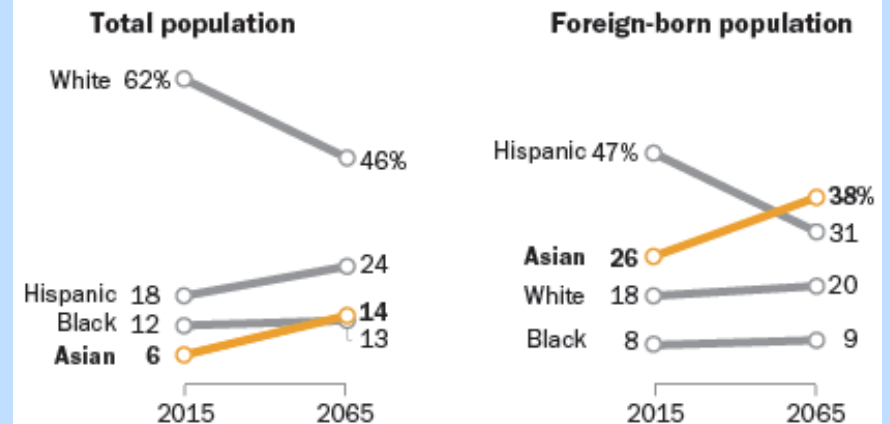
